Generations of students' lives are changing, whether they participate in the formal religious life activities because they are getting consistent doses of faith throughout their experience at the college.

I think of Andrew College and the nurses they are now able to supply to an extremely underserved region of our state. I think of the fact that over 40% of the nurses serving the hospital system in LaGrange's region are LaGrange graduates. Those nurses hold the hands of the scared, the joyful, the dying—they are the hands of God—and our college prepared their hearts and minds for the job.

I think of Reinhardt and the musicians and police officers they send out into the world. Compassionate, thoughtful, talented voices in our community that give us peace, albeit in two different forms, but nevertheless impactful.

I think of Young Harris and the teachers they send into classrooms across the state to minister to the young. I think of their involvement in the local community—for a long time, providing a professor to teach AP-level courses as the county high school had no such offering.

I think of Wesleyan and the strong, faithful women that come from that unique experience. The nurses, the scientists—we don't yet know what these STEM majors will go out into the world and solve, but I know they will do amazing things.

I think of Paine College and the high number of first generation, low income students that they serve. These are students that could easily fall through the cracks.

When I think of Clark Atlanta, I remember its important role in our country's history. For a long time, it was the only place a person of color could obtain a graduate degree. It now has the leading prostate cancer research center focused on African-American men in the country. What a gift our denomination will give to the world, the pain that will be avoided for families, when they figure out how to better detect and cure this cancer.

Campus Crawl 2019 Recap.


